Project Horizon: Beat Felix

Mr Coghlan writes: Horizon's mission to Beat Felix, has been a real adventure. The training flight, 'Gagarin' broke all previous school altitude records, reaching 35118m. This was followed by their first high altitude probe, 'Armstrong' which smashed Gagarin's record, reaching 38915m. Armstrong was just 130m below the altitude achieved by Felix Baumgartner and the Red Bull Stratos Team. The Beat Felix Team are pinning their hopes on their final flight, 'Hadfield', which will launch on Saturday 5th July (after this newsletter had gone to print). Over £2400 was raised in equipment and funds with several high profile sponsors getting involved. The project has attracted lots of attention with

congratulations from adventurer/presenter Dallas Campbell, Valerie Vaz MP, the Rt Hon David Willetts MP (Minister for Universities and Science), Major Timothy Peake (the British Astronaut), the UK Space Agency and the European Space Agency. The project's next mission, 'Sun Chaser' has been awarded a Special Merit Prize by Rolls-Royce along with £1000 in funding. 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Sport

Cricket

Mr Langton reports: This year has seen the partnership with Walsall CC blossom and set firm foundations for the future of cricket at QMGS. As well as Walsall CC playing their 3rd XI fixtures at the school and using the sports hall for their winter nets, coaches Mike Hingley and Jon Moore have been instrumental in running practices and assisting staff in officiating fixtures.

On the field, the senior sides have come across some challenging opposition, with 1st XI fixtures against KE Aston and Five Ways being rather one sided, but some promising individual performances give hope for the future. Tayib Akram scored 40 in the senior house fixtures and followed this up with 3-14 against KE Aston in captaining the 2nd XI. Najuf Ikhlaq scored an impressive 61 no in the KE Aston match to successfully chase 122. Najuf also managed to score 46 in the house semi-finals; the final of this competition won by Nathan Blackwood's 44 for Aragon over Darby. The 1st XI managed to beat the staff in a close game by 2 wickets, Navjoth Rai scoring 25 not out as the students chased 107 for victory, despite 3-12 from Mr Ridler.

The U15 side have battled hard, but have struggled to post competitive scores. Jack Lowe's 51 against Lawrence Sheriff School (LSS) was undoubtedly the highlight, but a close game against Bablake (losing by 2 wickets) showed that the team have the necessary grit to succeed. Mahan Dulai took 3-14 in this game.

Ben Hopton has led the U14 side by example, being the leading run scorer and wicket taker. Ben took 6-18 in a losing cause against Bablake at the start of the season and scored his first half century (51 no) for the school against LSS. Musa Iqbal has flourished with the ball this season, taking wickets in games against LSS (2-7) and Old Swinford Hospital (OSH) (1-10). The B team secured a memorable 4 run win against KE Aston, defending just 50, with Giaan Sidhu taking 2-1 and Imran Dalvi 2-6 (photo below).

The main headline for the U13s has got to be from the house competition, where Rohit





Suglani took advantage of some shortened boundaries (due to the wet ground) and plundered an unbeaten 103, including 5 sixes in the final over! Rohit has continued his form into school games, scoring 33 no in a 10 wicket win against LSS. The A team (above) lost a close game against BVGS, but have shown some real spirit and potential for the future.

The enthusiasm of the U12 team has been infectious this year, with bumper practice turnouts stretching back to December. The A and B teams have worked hard with Mike and Mr Collins and have secured some excellent results. Parmdeep Kalsi has excelled for the A team, scoring 16 and taking 4-12 in a win over Bablake, as well as 21 and 1-8 in a narrow defeat to LSS. Nikhil Rathod has shone for the B team, scoring 47 no and taking 4-2 in the win over Bablake and 4-18 and 14 no against LSS. A tie for the A team and win for Bs against BVGS were also part of an exciting season.
